

In 1980, the past president of K-B, Cal Cooper, wrote, "We have completed the most successful year in the history of K-B, achieving goals we did not consider possible. We are concerned with the recession, as we should be....but we will weather the storm by doing the good job we have proven we are capable of doing and by managing the operations with proven methods."

As we persevere during the recent "worst recession since the Great Depression," Kelso-Burnett continues to "weather the storm" by providing superior workmanship and customer service to all of its customers. Cal Cooper's statement during the recession of 1980 is a reminder that history truly has a way of repeating itself. The core values Cal expressed 30 years ago remain equivalent with the current belief system of Kelso-Burnett Co. in today's market.



K-B completes construction on Northern Illinois University's East Campus Chiller Plant



Recently, Kelso-Burnett Co. worked together with River City Construction and Henneman Engineering, Inc. on the construction of a new chiller plant at Northern Illinois University's East Campus in Dekalb, Illinois. Although the project was on hold for nearly a decade, NIU eventually received the necessary funding from the Capital Development Board, the Illinois Department of Commerce, and the Illinois Department of Economic Opportunity to build the new structure. Construction on the new East Campus chiller plant began in September of 2008 and concluded in April of 2010.

The East Campus chiller plant is a single-story steel and concrete structure with custom built masonry cooling towers. It contains a full basement that houses four 1200-ton electric centrifugal chillers that have the capacity of 4,800 tons, and a future capacity of 7,200 tons of cooling. The structure now serves as a chilled water cooling system for many of Northern Illinois University's East Campus buildings, such as "Altgeld Hall, Campus Life, Faraday Hall, Faraday West, Founders Library, the Health Service Center (including the Speech-Language-Hearing Clinic, University Police and Telecom), the Holmes Student Center, Gilbert Hall, Lowden Hall, Montgomery Hall, the Music Building, the Psychology/ Computer Science Building, Swen Parson Hall, the Visual Arts Building, Williston Hall and Wirtz Hall," according to the October 29, 2007 article in NIU – Northern Today. Overall, the new facility will greatly reduce the university's future energy costs. In reality, chilled water cooling is very environmentally friendly, and much quieter than NIU's previous chillers.

Contracted by the Capital Development Board, Kelso-Burnett was responsible for furnishing and installing Northern Illinois University's electrical requirements for the East Campus chiller plant. Kelso-Burnett's project team, consisting of Rockford Branch Division Manager Mike Cultra and Superintendent Doug Branch, installed a 13.8kv primary duct bank and tested and terminated cable. Other tasks included installations of two primary manholes, one 4000 amp service, two 3000 amp services, one 13.8 kv pad mounted switch, one 3000 kva 13.8 to 480 volt pad mounted transformer, four 125 hp VFDs, eight 60 hp VFDs, four 25 hp VFDs, a new fire alarm system and other miscellaneous chiller controls during project duration.



We'd like to thank River City Construction's project team consisting of Project Manager Ed Counsil and Superintendent Dan Taylor, along with Henneman Engineering's project team consisting of Project Managers Mark Blazis and Jim Brody. Together they worked superbly with Kelso-Burnett's project team on all areas of the East Campus Chiller Project. We'd also like to thank Northern Illinois University and the Capital Development Board for overseeing all construction activities, and for contributing to the success of this extremely technical project.

We thank all those who applied and wish this past year's Butz Scholars continued success in their studies.


Contech MSI Co. Awarded 6-Year Monitoring Contract

In the summer of 2010, Contech MSI Co. will begin a very large monitoring contract installing radios at various Waukegan, Illinois locations. Over the course of the next year, Contech will be installing 800 radios in various businesses, schools, and municipal buildings throughout the Waukegan area. Upon completion of the initial radio installations, Contech will be providing technical services and routine maintenance for the next 6 years to ensure that the system functions properly.

Upon completion, the radio installations will ultimately be tied in directly to the Waukegan Police Dispatch Center so that authorities will be able to be notified in the event of fire or burglary attempts whenever an alarm is triggered. The radios will comprise of a "Mesh Radio Network" which allows for continuous connections and reconfiguration around broken or blocked paths to reach its destination. In other words, the radios will



feed off each other to route a signal back to the police department to alert the authorities of any major issues that require immediate attention.
